Slide 3: Recommendation Themes

- 1. Take a human rights approach to disability
- 2. Make 'nothing about us without us' real
- 3. Keep it simple
- 4. Think local
- 5. Support a fairer future
- 6. Strong leadership, strong workforce and good use of data

Slide 4: 1. Deliver the Council's Equality Plan

- Council has passed a motion committing itself to the United Nations
 Convention on the Rights of Disabled People
- · Council has formally adopted the social model of disability
- The half day equalities training all staff should attend has been reviewed to highlight the meaning and requirements of the above
- The equalities analysis approach has been reviewed and a group put in place to moderate draft analyses

Next steps: Whilst the framework is in place it will take time to embed

Slide 5: 2. Co-production and Community Empowerment

- This recommendation was highlighted by the LGA Peer Review and included in their recommendations
- The Council has both a corporate and an ASC working group developing our approach to coproduction, is mapping internal and external good practice, and has lead to tangible changes (eg Direct Payments)
- This is being developed in line with the Local Voices Framework that CWVA are leading on, to define a framework and principles for the borough
- CWVA have worked with partners to develop a draft definition and principles around coproduction

Next Steps: workshops are planned to test the draft principles forthcoming coproduction of day opportunities

Slide 6: 3. Community Led Support Programme

- 'Lets Talk' sites are operational in Ellesmere Port, Lache, Blacon and Winsford
- The Northwich and Rural sites are in planning and on schedule for delivery by April 2024
- Feedback from community led support work is being used to update and improve the Livewell Cheshire West website

Next steps: Discussions are ongoing about how to best grow the approach, in terms of geographic, topic and partner coverage

Slide 7: 4. Community Sector Market Shaping and Commissioning Plan

- A working group is in place, including CWVA and Age UK Cheshire,
 overseeing an agreed action plan. However it has not met recently
- The Council's Market Position Statement has been updated and published
- Community Catalysts are working to support the delivery of a micro-provider programme

Next steps: Commissioners are identifying commissions in the pipeline for alternative approaches

Slide 8: 5. Review of Adult Social Care Charging

- 1. The Council has reviewed its debt recovery approach
- 2. An annual process to review charges and allowances has been introduced
- 3. The discretionary element of the MIG, the CW&C discretionary banded DRE allowances and the PEA have all been increased at the level of inflation
- 4. Disability related expenditure guidance guidance is being developed

Next steps: the implementation of national charging reforms has been delayed

Slide 9: 6. Implementation of the Integrated Care System

- The Place Plan has been updated and extended
- The CWHCP Committee has been established with an independent chair
- Transformation Programme agreed at Cheshire West Place level
- · Recruitment of most senior posts now complete
- Continuing investment in leadership
- An Adult Social Care LGA Peer Review took place in early March

Next Steps: Continued work on ICS delegations to Place and ongoing recruitment

Slide 10: 7. Communicating the Commission

- The report was presented to the HWBB
- Cllr Armstrong wrote to the Secretary of State for Health and Social Care to lobby for better funding so staff could be fairly rewarded and a training and career structure developed
- A members workshop was held focusing on the cost of adult social care services
- The report and process has been publicised with the LGA and the CCIN
