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Welcome to Cheshire West and Chester

The staff who work in the Registration Service will do everything they can to help make your day special and to ensure that your ceremony is a relaxed and enjoyable occasion.

This brochure has been designed to help you plan your day and choose the content of your marriage ceremony.

Once you have had time to consider your ceremony, we can discuss your requirements in person or over the telephone.

For legal reasons we are unable to include any words, readings or music which may have religious connotations.

If you have any questions, please contact us.



Planning Your Wedding Day

Essential Preliminaries

You will already have made preparations for your day by booking your venue, arranging the registrar and giving your legal notices of marriage.

If you are unsure about any of these essential preliminaries, please ring our Ceremonies Officer on 0300 123 7037.

Arrival

Please arrive in good time, allowing sufficient time for photographs to be taken. If you are late it may not be possible for us to conduct your ceremony.

If your marriage is taking place in one of our register offices, please arrive at least 15 minutes before the start time.

If your marriage is being held in one of our approved premises the Registrars will arrive approximately 30 minutes before the ceremony is due to start.

Upon arrival the Registrar will see you privately to check the details which will be entered in the register, including both your fathers' names and occupations. Depending on your personal choice, you can be seen separately or together.



Witnesses

It is a legal requirement for two people to witness your marriage, so please arrange for them to be present.

They can be friends or relatives, usually over the age of 16 and able to understand the ceremony. They will be asked to sign the marriage register and their names will appear on your marriage certificate.

Number of Guests Permitted

Each venue has a limit on the number of people that can be comfortably accommodated in their ceremony room. If you are unsure of how many guests may attend, please check with us or your venue before sending your invitations out.

Music

Music certainly enhances the occasion and is usually played as the guests are arriving, for the entrance, during the signing of the register and as you leave the room.

If you are marrying at one of our approved premises, you may wish to check what facilities they have for playing recorded music.

Our register offices have a CD player and a range of background music. You are welcome to bring your own choice of music but it is a good idea to check before the day that the CD works on the register office sound system.

Please remember that for legal reasons, religious music is not permitted. Your Registrar will be pleased to offer advice.



Photography and Videos

Your guests are very welcome to bring cameras to record the occasion.

Confetti

If your ceremony is taking place at one of our approved premises please make enquiries with the venue direct.

In the register office we are happy for your guests to throw confetti but it would help us greatly if they could wait until they are outside the building before doing so.

Car Parking

For information about parking at approved premises please contact the venue direct.

On the enclosed leaflet we have provided a map indicating parking facilities near our register office.

Change of Contact Details

In case we need to get in touch before your ceremony, please inform us of any changes in your contact details.

Change of Plans

To help us provide the highest possible quality of service please tell us immediately if any of your plans change.



The Choice is Yours

There are many ways in which you can make your ceremony special and personal.

Here are some ideas for you to consider:

- You may wish to follow the tradition of not seeing one another before the ceremony.
- You could be escorted into the ceremony room by a family member or another person of your choice.
- You may be given away by a family member or friend.
- You may like to be attended by bridesmaids, flower-girls and/or page-boys.
- You may wish to be attended by a best-man or groomsmen.
- You may include live or recorded music that has special significance to you.
- If you wish, the marriage may be sealed by the exchange of rings.



- The Registrar would be happy to include any personal announcements on your behalf for example, by mentioning guests who have travelled from abroad.
- You may choose to make special promises to each other in addition to your legal vows (see italic burgundy text on pages 12 to 17).
- A relative, friend or your Registrar could read poetry or prose that you have chosen or written yourself (see page 18).

Of course you may prefer a short, simple ceremony that does not include additional promises or readings (shown in bold text on pages 12 to 17).

Frequently Asked Questions

What is the difference between a simple and enhanced ceremony?

A simple ceremony includes all the elements that are required to make a legal ceremony. An enhanced ceremony gives you the opportunity to also include additional promises and readings of your choice.

How long does the ceremony last?

A simple ceremony will last for about 20 minutes, including the signing of the register. Ceremonies with enhancements will naturally last longer.

How many registrars attend?

Two members of the Registration Service will be involved in your ceremony; the Superintendent Registrar will conduct the marriage, while the Registrar completes the record in the marriage register and will issue the marriage certificate.

Do I need to memorise any words?

It is not necessary for you to memorise any words as the Superintendent Registrar will lead you through the ceremony. When it is your turn to speak the Superintendent Registrar will say a few words at a time which you then repeat.

Do we have to exchange rings?

It is not essential to exchange rings although many couples choose to do this as a traditional part of their ceremony. You may decide to give two rings or only one.

Exchange of Ring(s)

We now come to the part of the ceremony where you exchange wedding rings, which is the traditional way of sealing the marriage contract.

The registrar will then announce that you have both made the legal declarations required by law in the presence of your witnesses, families and guests and you are now legally married.

The signing of the register and photographs

During the ceremony the Registrar will write the couples' details in the marriage register. At the end of the ceremony they will be asked to carefully check the details and to sign the entry. The witnesses will also be asked to sign.

Please remember that the register is signed in the names you used during the ceremony.

Once the register has been signed, there is an opportunity for posed photographs to be taken with witnesses, family and friends.
