Main aims, purpose and outcomes and how does it fit in with the wider aims of the organisation:

The Children & Young People's Service holds the lead responsibility on behalf of Cheshire West and Chester Council for the delivery of services to safeguard children and families.

Only a small percentage of children nationally and in Cheshire West and Cheshire require the support or intervention from Children and Young People Service. Most people access support required through universal services available to all children and families.

The majority of children and families who become involved with this service have complex needs and may need support services which are delivered by a range of agencies. Such services are focused on promoting the welfare of children and young people, safeguarding from harm and protecting children who, without such intervention ,would be at risk of significant harm or neglect.

Services are delivered under legislative frameworks and associated guidance, including the Children Act 1989, the Adoption and Children Act 2002, Children Act 2004, Care Leavers Act 2002 and Care Standards Act 2000

The service continues to provide a robust management oversight and accountability to its work through increased capacity at Team Manager and Senior Manager Level which allows continued focus on good quality and timely assessments and plans for the children. The role of the Senior Practice Leads to work with complex cases and provided a mentoring and coaching role to social workers to improve practice in all area's and assist with newly qualified social workers and the assessment requirements within their first year of employment continues to be consolidated.

The service seeks to deliver caseloads that are appropriately weighted addressing the skill mix within the social work team and ensuring children and families receive good quality, timely social work support.

Policies and Procedures are regularly reviewed and can be found on the Chester West and Chester website and ensure services delivered are meeting statutory guidance and legislative requirements.

Assessments and plans are regularly audited by Team Managers, Senior Managers and the LSCB Audit group focussing upon aspects of equality and diversity and establishing the uniqueness of each child's wishes and views as well as capturing the voice of the child.
- The Cheshire West and Chester scrutiny process provides challenge on service provision and delivery, it establishes whether the rights of the child and family have been acknowledged as prescribed in the Human Rights Act 1998.
- The Local Safeguarding Children's Board procedures are clear that they apply to all children irrespective of economic status, gender, race, disability, religion or sexual orientation.
- There are published standards on the Cheshire West and Cheshire website in relation to Initial and Core Assessments, the Children in Need planning and review procedures and the Single Assessment practice guidance.
